# BUSINESS BOOT CAMP IV (BBC IV)

Friday, Feb. 2, 9:00 AM – 5:30 PM + Pau Hana Saturday, Feb. 3, 9:00 AM – 4:00 PM In-Person Classes and Panels, Room CR2

This non-credit course offered live, in-person, introduces law school students to basic financial and business concepts. The idea is to lay the groundwork for the students' law school commercial and business courses and to help build financial literacy.

The Business Boot Camp, now in its fourth iteration, is an initiative promoted by **Dean Camille Nelson**. **Prof. Charles D. Booth** has led the organization of the course, assisted by **Profs. II. Session 1: Welcome and Introduction to the Fundamentals of Business Law 9:00 AM – 9:50 AM

Introduction to BBC IV and the fundamental financial and business law concepts and skills covered during the sessions.

**Dean Camille Nelson** will provide opening remarks. **Prof. Charles D. Booth** will provide an overview of BBC IV, introduce basic financial concepts, and discuss how to develop financial and business literacy and basic commercial skill sets.

In the context of setting up a business, **Dean Nicholas A. Mirkay** and **Prof. Justin D. Levinson** will discuss basic taxation concepts and basic business association concepts.

#### **Appendix 1: Speaker Biographies**

MR. DAVID F. ASMUS (BS, Yale University, 1981 (magna cum laude); JD, Harvard Law School, 1985) is a recently retired partner of Sidley Austin LLP (Houston). He focused his practice in the areas of energy project development and mergers and acquisitions, with particular emphasis on oil, gas and liquefied natural gas. During his career, he served as leader of the oil and gas practice at Baker Botts LLP, leader of the Energy Transactions Practice at Morgan Lewis, and co-leader of the Energy Practice at Sidley Austin LLP. He is past Chair of the Institute for Energy Law, past President of the Association of International Petroleum Negotiators, and past chair of the Oil & Gas Committee of the International Bar Association. He represented the lead operator in some of the world's largest energy projects, including Tangguh LNG in Indonesia, EG LNG in Equatorial Guinea, and Cameron LNG in Louisiana, USA. He also handled numerous large-scale M&A projects in the energy sector, including the privatization of the Elk Hills Naval Petroleum Reserve in California, and Dominion's \$13 billion+ divestiture of its oil and gas operations. He has been ranked in Chambers USA: America's Leading Lawyers for Business (2003-2021) and Chambers Global: The World's Leading Lawyers for Business (2000-2021), and in 2006 Chambers USA awarded him the "Award for Excellence" for Work in the Oil and Gas Sector. He was selected as "Energy Lawyer of the Year" by The International Who's Who of Business Lawyers (2015-2016) and was also selected as "International Lawyer of the Year" for Oil and Gas by The International Who's Who of Business Lawyers (2005, 2008 & 2012-2014). He was named an "Energy and Environmental Trailblazer" by *The National Law Journal*, and *Lawdragon* named him one of America's 500 Leading Lawyers (2005-2007, 2011, 2015).

PROF. DAN BLACKABY (BA, University of Houston, 1995; JD, Michigan State University, 2000; MLISc, San Jose State University, 2006; MA, California State University-Fullerton, 2012) is a Reference and Instructional Services Librarian at the Richardson School of Law, where he teaches classes in legal research and scholarly legal writing methodologies. Dan has worked as a professional librarian in various roles including research, technology, cataloging and acquisitions. Dan has a rich background in law librarianship, and has worked in many different library settings, including the Montana Department of Natural Resources, Microsoft Corporation, the Santa Clara County Counsel, South Texas College of Law, and served for eight years as Head of Technology Initiatives at the Cornell University Law Library. He is actively involved with the American Association of Law Libraries, having served as an executive board member for both the Legal History & Rare Books and Computing Services Special Interest Sections. In recent years, he has been invited to speak at national forums on topics ranging from digital repositories to blockchain technology. He has avid interests in Hawaiian history and cartography.

PROFESSOR CHARLES D. BOOTH (BA, Yale University, 1981 (summa cum laude & Phi Beta Kappa); JD, Harvard Law School, 1984 (cum laude)) is the Michael J. Marks Distinguished Professor in Business Law and the Founding Director of the Institute of



Asian-Pacific Business Law (IAPBL) at the Richardson School of Law. He focuses on comparative and cross-border insolvency and commercial law. After law school, he practiced at Cleary, Gottlieb, Steen and Hamilton on Wall Street (1984-1986), taught at the Richardson School of Law (1986-1989), taught in the Faculty of Law at the University of Hong Kong (1989-2005) and returned to the Richardson School of Law in 2006. He Secured Transactions. Debtors' Creditors' teaches and Rights, Reorganization, Asian-Pacific Insolvency Law, International Business Law in Asia, and Comparative Law. He is a Fellow in the American College of Bankruptcy, a Member of the International Academy of Commercial and Consumer Law, and a Founding Member of the International Insolvency Institute. He has co-authored: A Global View of Business Insolvency Systems (2010); the Hong Kong Corporate Insolvency Manual (4th ed., 2018); and the Hong Kong Personal Insolvency Manual (3rd ed, 2023). He frequently serves as a consultant on insolvency and commercial law reform and training projects for many international organizations, including the World Bank Group, the IMF and the Asian Development Bank. He recently contributed to the new Lao Law on Rehabilitation and Bankruptcy of Enterprises and a draft insolvency law for Bhutan and co-led insolvency training seminars for judges and insolvency professionals in Beijing and Phnom Penh. He is a member of the Hawaii Bankruptcy Bar Association Board and a Member of the University of Hawai'i at Manoa Center for Chinese Studies Executive Committee, and he recently completed a term as a Member of the Kailua Racquet Club Board of Directors.

Ms. Sherry P. Broder (BA, Wellesley College, 1970 (Wellesley Scholar); JD, Boalt Hall, University of California at Berkeley, 1975 (Highest Honors & Order of the Coif)) is a legal practitioner concentrating in complex civil litigation - trials, appeals, and class actions, personal injury, medical malpractice, products liability, international law, ocean law, environmental law, human rights, and rights of Native Hawaiians and other indigenous people. She has extensive experience in Hawai'i real estate and business transactions and litigation, administrative law, land development, and water rights and has advised some of Hawaii's largest hotels and resorts. She serves as a mediator, an arbitrator and a hearings officer for state and federal government agencies, the Hawai'i Supreme Court, and private parties. She was the first woman President of the Hawai'i State Bar Association and was the 2016 President of the Federal Bar Association for the District of Hawai'i. She was selected as a Finalist by Public Justice for the Trial Lawyer of the Year Award in 1994, 1995, and 1997 and was selected by the ABA as the 1992 Solo Practitioner of the Year. In 2015, the ABA awarded her the Solo and Small Firm Lifetime Achievement Award. She is a Lecturer in Law at the Richardson School of Law and teaches International Law and Ocean Law. She is currently the Chair of the Commission on Clean Water and Natural Resources, City and County of Honolulu.

**DR. JACQUIE CARROLL** (BA, Public Administration, 1994; EdD, Nova Southeastern University) currently serves as Regional Director-West, for AccessLex Institute-Center for Education and Financial Capability. She is a sought-after national speaker and was instrumental in the research and development of MAX, by AccessLex, an award-winning personal finance program for law students. As a researcher, educator, speaker, and



Accredited Financial Counselor® (AFC), she found the perfect fit to combine research and practicality. She facilitates sharing and building knowledge to help individuals equalize the financial playing field with a focus on outcomes and results with a focus on practical strategies. Her research on instructional design, learner outcomes, and financial education has been featured in the *MERLOT Journal of Online Learning and Teaching*, The Consortium for Student Data Retention Research, Magna publications' *The Teaching Professor* and *The Online Classroom*, and AFCPE's *The Standard*. She currently serves on the Board of Directors for AFCPE, the governing body overseeing AFC certifications.

PROFESSOR RICHARD C. CHEN (AB, Harvard University, 2002 (cum laude); JD, Harvard Law School, 2009 (magna cum laude)) is an Associate Professor of Law at the Richardson School of Law, where he teaches Contracts, Equitable Remedies, and International Economic Law. After law school, he clerked for the US Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit and practiced in complex business litigation at Munger, Tolles & Olson LLP in Los Angeles. His research focuses on international investment law and international arbitration, as well as on precedent and judicial decision-making. His scholarship has appeared in the Harvard Law Review, Yale Journal of International Law, Harvard International Law Journal, and Virginia Journal of International Law.

THE HONORABLE ROBERT J. FARIS (UNITED STATES BANKRUPTCY COURT, DISTRICT COURT OF HAWAI'I) (BA, Reed College, 1980 (Phi Beta Kappa); JD, Boalt Hall School of Law, University of California, Berkeley, 1983 (Order of the Coif)) is a US Bankruptcy Judge for the District of Hawai'i. From 1983 until 2002, he practiced with a Honolulu law firm, emphasizing bankruptcy, insolvency, and commercial litigation. He became a bankruptcy judge in February 2002 and a member of the Ninth Circuit Bankruptcy Appellate Panel in 2015. He is a Fellow in the American College of Bankruptcy and is a Lecturer in Law at the Richardson School of Law, where he teaches Debtors' and Creditors' Rights and Corporate Reorganization.

PROFESSOR GARRETT I. HALYDIER (BS, Liberty University, 2008; MBA Liberty University, 2009; JD, Richardson School of Law (magna cum laude), 2015) is a Visiting Assistant Professor and Interim Director of Academic Success at the Richardson School of Law, and he is the Deputy Director of IAPBL. He teaches courses in Cannabis Law, Secured Transactions, Legal Analysis, and Bar Preparation and coaches the Phillip C. Jessup International Law Moot Court team. He maintains his own law firm serving corporate, real estate, and cannabis industry clients and provides business development consulting for small law firms. He was recently awarded Teacher of the Year by Kaplan, Inc., for his ongoing international work as an elite private test tutor. He previously founded the Hawai'i Dispensary Alliance, a trade association advocating for medical cannabis in Hawai'i; clerked at the Hawai'i Intermediate Court of Appeals; founded an award winning national marketing company; and won the Frank S. Harrison Memorial Award for Excellence in Coaching from the United States Naval Academy for coaching a repeat national champion college policy debate team. He writes on US cannabis business law, social equity in the cannabis industry, pharmaceutical industry dynamics, and market design for emerging



industries. His work was recently incorporated into Hawai'i's Act 169 Dual-Use of Cannabis Task Force 2022 report to the Hawai'i State Legislature.

Ms. Lea Hong (BA, Rice University, 1988; JD, Richardson School of Law, 1991) has been the Hawaiian Islands State Director of The Trust for Public Land, a national non-profit organization dedicated to conserving land for people, since 2006. She previously chaired the environmental and cultural resource law practice group at the Honolulu law firm of Alston Hunt Floyd & Ing (now Dentons) and worked for the Earthjustice Legal Defense Fund. She serves on the Friends of the Richardson School of Law Advisory Board and has taught classes on Environmental Litigation, Environmental Regulatory Compliance, and Conservation Transactions. She has been recognized as one of Hawai'i's best environmental lawyers and counts her claim to fame being named a Kama'āina of the Year (for the environment) at the same time as Marcus Mariota! She is from Wahiawā, on the island of Oʻahu.

Ms. Lauren Kagawa (BS & BA, Chapman University, 2014; JD, Richardson School of Law, 2018) is a sixth-year associate at the law firm of Starn O'Toole Marcus & Fisher. She focuses her practice in the areas of real estate and commercial transactions and often assists clients with real estate acquisitions, sales and development, commercial leasing and corporate structuring for clients ranging from small commercial entities to large hotel chains. During her years at Richardson, she served judicial externships with Federal Magistrate Judge Kevin Chang and Circuit Court Judge Bert Ayabe and was a research assistant as a part of the Scholar Advocate Program. She now enjoys serving as an officer on the 'Iolani Alumni Board and volunteers with the Business Law Corps in its partnership with the High Technology Development Corporation and the Patsy T. Mink Center for Business and Leadership to offer free legal advice to small businesses. WILLIAM KANEKO (BA, University of Puget Sound, 1983; JD, Columbus School of Law, The Catholic University of America, 1996) is a partner in the Honolulu office of Dentons US LLP, where he advises clients on administrative law, government relations, and public policy. He advises Fortune 500 companies, government agencies and nonprofits on policy, programmatic, and legal issues relating to energy, health care, transportation, technology, real estate, and civil rights. He is widely recognized for his understanding of the legal, regulatory, policy, and political frameworks in which companies and governments exist, and for developing practicable, interdisciplinary solutions to advance key client initiatives. He has been listed in Best Lawyers in America for Government Relations every year since 2009. Best Lawyers in America also named him Hawai'i Lawyer of the Year for Government Relations in 2014, 2017, 2021, and 2024.

**PROFESSOR MARK A. LEVIN** (BBA, University of Michigan, 1980; JD, Yale Law School 1983; LLM, University of Washington, 1990) is a Professor of Law and the Director of the



Pacific and Asian Legal Studies (PALS) Program at the Richardson School of Law and is concurrently serving as the Director of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Center for Japanese Studies. He came to Hawai'i in January 1997 from the Law Department of Hokkaido University in Sapporo, Japan. His interest in Japan began after his 1983 graduation from Yale Law School, when he worked in international business and financial transactions at Masuda and Ejiri, one of the leading Tokyo international law offices at the time. From 1984 to 1986, he clerked for US District Court Judge John C. Coughenour in Seattle, Washington, and then practiced in Seattle for five years as a corporate attorney, representing numerous Japanese clients. He earned an LLM from the University of Washington's Asian Law Program (Japanese Law Emphasis) in 1990. At Richardson, in the business law arena, Mark has taught Comparative Law, International Business Transactions, International Business Lawyering in Asia, Japanese Business Law, and Sales (UCC Article 2).

Ms. Tracey Lesetar-Smith (BA, Duke University, honors distinction); JD George Washington University Law School, is the Principal and CEO of TLSK Advisory. Through TLSK Advisory, she consults for media, sports leagues, athlete associations and commissions, health, public safety, and nonprofit growth enterprises on capital go-to-market strategy, partnerships/sponsorships, funding/raise. public operational efficiency, staffing, and DEI. She is former Senior Vice President and General Counsel of NASCAR, part of the senior-most C-suite overseeing the league through its historic \$4 billion merger, culminating in the addition of twelve massive racetracks to a league portfolio of eight racing series across three continents. She oversaw the reorganization of fifty corporate subsidiaries and was a pivotal decision-maker and crisis manager for NASCAR throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. She also led Government and Community Affairs for NASCAR, both shepherding NASCAR's crucial relationships with public officials and community organizations everywhere that NASCAR holds races and serving as Chairwoman of NASCAR's longstanding corporate PAC. Prior to NASCAR, Tracey was General Counsel and Vice President of Business and Legal Affairs for Bellator MMA (a ViacomCBS property), and later, for ViacomCBS generally. As one of the league's first C-suite leaders, and first woman in this role in history, she helped build Bellator to be one of the fiercest and longest-standing competitors in the MMA space, expanding operations into nine countries, exponentially growing Bellator's global media rights revenue business, spearheading legalization of MMA in France and New York, and ushering in the first legitimate free agency market for MMA athletes in decades. She previously worked on both sides of the regulatory compliance and government affairs relationship, first as a regulator under various elements of the federal government and then as an associate doing compliance work at international firm Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP in California. She recently returned from a twelve-month sabbatical: five suitcases, two children, two adventurous parents, 42,475 miles, three continents, and the adventure of a lifetime.

PROFESSOR JUSTIN LEVINSON (BA, University of Michigan, 1996 (with distinction); JD, UCLA 1999 (Order of the Coif); LLM, Harvard, 2004), a Professor of Law at the



Richardson School of Law, is a leader in the field of implicit bias and the law, and an expert in psychological decision-making in the legal system. His scholarship, which regularly employs experimental social science methodology, has appeared in the *NYU Law Review*, Yale Law Journal Forum, UCLA Law Review, and Duke Law Journal, among others, and has been cited by the US Supreme Court. He served as lead editor of *Implicit Racial Bias Across the Law*, a volume that was published by Cambridge University Press in 2012 (co-edited by Robert J. Smith). In 2008, he founded the Culture and Jury Project, an interdisciplinary and international research collaboration devoted to facilitating the study of human decision-making in the law. He is currently collaborating with scholars in China, Japan, and Korea, as well as domestically in the United States. He previously practiced corporate law at Wilson Sonsini Goodrich & Rosati in Palo Alto, California. He regularly teaches Business Associations, Law and Psychology, Corporate Finance, and High Growth Entrepreneurship, and has offered a seminar on Implicit Bias and the Law.

PROFESSOR EMILE LOZA DE SILES (BS, Oklahoma State University System; MBA, University of Houston-Clear Lake; JD, George Washington University Law School; Cybersecurity Strategy Management Graduate Certificate, Georgetown University; Data Science Graduate Studies, Harvard University) is an Assistant Professor of Law at the Richardson School of Law. She teaches Intellectual Property, Real Property, and a groundbreaking doctrinal course on Artificial Intelligence and Social Justice and also regularly sponsors Richardson Law students on directed research studies. She also teaches graduate cybersecurity courses as an adjunct Associate Professor with the University of Maryland Global Campus. Her interdisciplinary scholarship on artificial intelligence (AI) and law emphasizes AI governance; AI biases and impacts associated with human-focused Al systems and uses; and Al impacts on social justice and the rule Since 2019, she has served on the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers' (IEEE's) Artificial Intelligence Policy Committee, and, in 2023, led a delegation of Richardson Law students to Washington, DC, to conduct 20 Congressional meetings on responsible and informed Al legislation. She serves on the inaugural Executive Committee of the Association of American Law Schools' Section on Critical Legal Theories and has recently concluded her immediate-chairship of the 1300+ member Section on Minority Groups. In 2003, she founded Technology Law Group and has since represented numerous technology innovators, including Cisco, HP, and Accenture. She served in the US Department of Commerce, Office of General Counsel and clerked for the Honorable Sérgio Gutiérrez of the Idaho Court of Appeals and the Honorable Sheila Anthony of the US Federal Trade Commission in Washington, DC. She has published and presented extensively, including to the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy, Serbia's Institute of Economic Sciences, Technische Universität Berlin El Gouna, Università degli Studi di Napoli Parthenope, law schools across the United States, and many global technology companies and business organizations.

**DEAN NICHOLAS A. MIRKAY** (BSBA, Saint Louis University, 1989 (*magna cum laude*); JD, University of Missouri, 1992; LLM in Taxation, Georgetown University Law Center, 1996 (with distinction)) is a Professor of Law and Associate Dean of Academic Affairs at the



Richardson School of Law. Before joining the Richardson faculty in August 2017, he was a Professor of Law at Creighton University School of Law for six years, serving as the Senior Associate Dean for Administration Planning for his last two years. Both as a founder of these organizations and in his own private capacity, Rob mentors numerous startup companies and is involved more broadly in mentoring Hawai'i's startup economy as a whole. He sat on the Hawai'i Life Sciences Council, the HIBEAM Board (a virtual accelerator), and the Hawai'i Strategic Development Corporation Advisory Board. Today he remains on the Board of the Hawai'i Venture Capital Association and is a senior mentor for companies at Blue Startups, Hawai'i's nationally ranked technology accelerator.
